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### 26<sup>th</sup> April 2020 – Third Sunday of Easter

**NEW LIFE:** A rainbow is built on the clouds of a preceding storm. It is a symbol of hope arising out of the darkness of grief or pain. It is a Christian symbol. Long ago God himself used the rainbow as a sign that the flood disaster was at an end and would not be repeated in the future. The two men who made their way to the town of Emmaus were enveloped in gloom. The one upon whom they had set their hopes was dead and they had expected so much from him. Since he had saved others why could he not have saved himself? They were walking in darkness until the stranger met them. He began to work on their minds and reveal to them the significance of words of Scripture which they had never understood before. Their hearts burnt within them. The light began to shine and then came the full revelation with the breaking of bread giving them a wonderful inner joy and hope.

Jesus said he had come to open the eyes of the blind. So often he is a stranger in our midst. We allow misfortune, trials of suffering so to darken our lives that we ignore the presence of the one whom we cannot see but we know, as Christians, to be close to us. The two disciples knew, once Christ had vanished from their sight, that he would never go from their presence. Christ is the Resurrection and the Life. He is the source of new life built out of sorrow or near despair. We tend to misread the signs of the times and do not realise that they are written in divine language. We do not understand that even grief and disaster can have divine meaning. "I am risen and am still with you", the Church sings on Easter morning. Christ must never be a stranger in our midst. We must always have the vision of faith to see him there. We should read his words in Scripture and try to understand what he is saying to us. Always it is a message of hope.
