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11th OCTOBER, 2020 – TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME

THE BANQUET: The Oriental has always set great store by hospitality. This is clear if one reads the Scriptures. From the account of meals in the Old and New Testament, it is evident that they were signs of a special relationship, not merely of friendliness but of friendship. Food taken in common had a unifying force. This is particularly clear in the New Testament, where meals are often mentioned. Christ took pleasure in being present at a marriage feast, joining with the bride and bridegroom and their guests, in an act of joy and love. For him, a meal had a messianic significance; he likened his kingdom on earth and in heaven to a banquet. He gave himself to the apostles in the form of food and drink. And offered himself to all in the same manner. This divine food and drink were to be a preliminary to a great festive banquet over which God would preside forever.

It was about this banquet, that Christ gave us a parable. Though he was addressing the Jews, he had a much wider audience in mind. The master of the house sent out invitations to the feast to the notable citizens of the town. When all was ready, they suddenly began to excuse themselves. Naturally, he was angry at their insults and so had no further truck with them. Instead he sent out his servants to fill up the vacant spaces with anybody they could find, however poor and feeble. To the Jewish leaders, the parable was clear enough. The leaders of Israel refused all invitations of Christ, so the poor and the down-trodden and the Gentiles would come and enjoy the good things provided. The parable is an *echo of Christ's words Blessed are the poor in Spirit for theirs is the kingdom of heaven*. All are invited to the heavenly banquet, the good as well as the bad. But the latter must repent and enter the feast, wearing the wedding garment of charity. As always in Christ's teaching, only those who love can enter the kingdom.

Imposition of restrictions concerning Churches. From Friday, 24th July, further restrictions have been imposed due to a spike in the number of new infections. There is now

a limit of 100 people who can attend Mass, provided the 4 square metre per person rule is adhered to. However, our Church will hold at least forty persons according to this regulation, any overflow would have to be accommodated in the Marion Hall. There is still the requirement of taking names and contact details of attendees.

The Government has recommended the wearing of face masks when people are in crowded places, such as shopping centres, supermarkets, public transport, and *places of worship*. This is not mandatory, but strongly recommended given the length of time people are together at Mass.

Parishioners who elect to attend Mass during the pandemic should consider the safety of other parishioners by staying away if they are unwell, and if so, getting tested and self-isolating while awaiting the results. It is also advisable that parishioners only attend Mass in their own parish and not move from parish to parish.

Please note, with the social distancing rule, only a maximum of fifty persons can be accommodated in the Church.

Confessions are now available before the 5 pm Vigil Mass (4 pm to 4.45 pm).
