8th November, 2020 – Thirty-Second Sunday of Ordinary Time

WISDOM: Life is made up of so many things, jobs, books, holidays, television, home life, business life, things that go wrong and things that go right. Most of these things are part of ordinary every day living, they are the means by which people earn their keep or enjoy relaxation. But they also have a deeper meaning. They are in a very real sense a preparation for the future. What is done in life decides what a person will be like when he arrives at the door of death. The things of life must therefore be sanctified by prayer and worship. The liturgy, for example, is intended to give an eternal value to the actions of the day, to give us the oil of Christ's grace so that when we come to the door, the oil is alight and shining and has not gone out.

For this we need the gift of the Holy Spirit called Wisdom. Scripture, speaking of it says: *It is an infinite treasure to men and those who possess it become the friends of God.* The wise person has foresight both for a future on earth and an eternal future, for it in this latter that we will become united with God for ever. Wisdom, then, is the keynote of today's Gospel. That wisdom which looks to the present as a preparation for the day when the summons to Christ's presence comes. None of us knows when that will be. Nor do we know how it will come. It may be by a sudden accident or a heart attack; on the other hand, it may come through a slow illness. But however, it will come, and we must be ready now to face it. *You know not the day or the hour*, says Christ. We are to be like sentries at their post always on duty, never allowing the enemy to come and destroy us. This does not mean that we should always be thinking of death, be filled with anxieties about it. On the contrary, we should be thinking of life – living it to the full in the service of God. If we do this, death should have no real terrors for us. The door will open for us to enter the marriage feast of the Lamb.

November is the Month of the Holy Souls: During November, I will be offering all my Masses for your deceased relatives and friends.

Imposition of restrictions concerning Churches. From Friday, 23rd October, restrictions on Church attendance have been eased. There is now a limit of 300 people who can attend Mass, provided the 4 square metre per person rule is adhered to. However, our Church will hold at least forty persons according to this regulation, any overflow would have to be accommodated in the Marion Hall. There is still the requirement of taking names and contact details of attendees.

The Government has recommended the wearing of face masks when people are in crowded places, such as shopping centres, supermarkets, public transport, and *places of worship*. This is not mandatory, but strongly recommended given the length of time people are together at Mass.

Parishioners who elect to attend Mass during the pandemic should consider the safety of other parishioners by staying away if they are unwell, and if so, getting tested and self-isolating while awaiting the results. It is also advisable that parishioners only attend Mass in their own parish and not move from parish to parish.

Please note, with the social distancing rule, only a maximum of fifty persons can be accommodated in the Church.

Confessions are now available before the 5 pm Vigil Mass (4 pm to 4.45 pm).
